

DIG

Neville Bonney was the DIG group's last speaker of the year. Returning by request he spoke to the group about his love of native food "Wild Food". He talked about how First Nations people and early European settlers grew native foods and how the knowledge of safe cultivation of them spread. He brought with him a selection of the wild food that was, and still is, harvested. We were all able to try some of the yummy food.

At first European settlers found wild food not to have the sweet taste that they were used to. This has gradually changed over the years.

Neville's innovative approach showed with his preparation of some of the berries that he had cooked, then coated in chocolate. He then presented them on toothpicks, quite delectable morsels. We also tried kangaroo sausages, kangaroo tail mettwurst with cheese, muntrie berries, finger limes, saltbush, samphire, quandongs made into dip, a variety of wattle seed and flour, and wattle seed biscuits. Saltbush and other wild greens, with a little garlic and olive oil added, were made into pesto.

We had a delightful, entertaining morning - Neville is a raconteur with a vast knowledge of natural world

Old Government House Visit

A visit to Old Government House was a step back into the 1800s for 18 members recently. We toured the house and enjoyed Devonshire tea in the renovated stables. Old Government House was the summer residence for some of SA early governors. The subsequent summer house at Marble Hill burned down, along with most of the historic furniture and artefacts, except for a few which were out on loan or being restored. Replacements of appropriate age are still being acquired. The house and garden are beautifully maintained by a small group of volunteers.

One of the highlights is the lead lined indoor pool, (bottom left) the first in South Australia, not somewhere we decided we would like to bathe. Antique kitchen items abound in the renovated staff quarters (top R). Below, elegant facade of verandah/balcony, and beautifully hand-stitched quilts and undies are just a few of the attractions. 
Visit to Regional Profile Cutters, Tailem Bend


