


Clara Adolphs uses discarded photographs as subjects of her paintings " a collective memory bank".

Jasmine Togo - Brisby focused on Australia's colonial legacy between 1887-1904 of 60,000 Pacific Islanders transported by slave ships to work in sugar cane fields. Her plaster shaped sculptures TamTams (musical drums) represented 369 bodies in a ship named Brookes. The plaster reference is due to the Wunderlick plaster factory where many gained employment after the slave trade was abolished.


FILM CLUB—JUNE
